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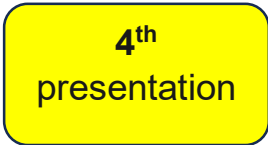
**Advancing Indigenous Health Through Indigenous Clinical Nurse Specialist Leadership: Reimagining CNS Competencies Through Indigenous Nursing Practice.**

**Short Description**

Indigenous Health and Cultural Safety Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS) roles represent an emerging and largely unrecognized area of advanced nursing practice in Canada. Currently, only two formally designated Indigenous Health and Cultural Safety CNS roles exist nationally, both held by Indigenous nurses in British Columbia.

Drawing on Indigenous nurse-led work and a gathering of Indigenous Clinical Nurse Specialists, Knowledge Holders, and nursing leaders, this presentation explores how Indigenous CNS practice aligns with core CNS competencies across clinical expertise, systems leadership, advancement of nursing practice, and research. Presenters will also introduce a fifth domain of CNS practice grounded in upholding Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation.

Attendees will gain insights into the unique contributions of Indigenous CNS leadership, the structural conditions required to sustain these roles, and opportunities to strengthen CNS practice and health system accountability across Canada.
